

BARRY KELLMAN

PROFESSOR OF LAW

Barry Kellman received his B.A. from the University of Chicago and his J.D. from Yale Law School. He teaches international law and directs the International Weapons Control Center at the DePaul University College of Law. Having published widely on: weapons proliferation and smuggling, the Chemical Weapons Convention, the laws of armed conflict, Middle East arms control, and nuclear non-proliferation, his recent articles have focused primarily on bio-terrorism issues, including: *Biological Terrorism: Legal Measures for Preventing Catastrophe*, Spring 2001; and *An International Criminal Law Approach To Bio-Terrorism*, Spring 2002.

Professor Kellman was the legal adviser to the National Commission on Terrorism in 2000 and a member of National Academies of Sciences Committee on Research Standards and Practices To Prevent the Destructive Application of Biotechnology. More recently, Professor Kellman's work has focused on engaging international organizations in efforts to prevent bio-crimes. He initiated and serves as Special Advisor to the Interpol Program on Preventing Bio-Crimes, and he works closely with many other international and regional bodies as well as with the United States and other governments.

He convened and chaired the workshop: *Preventing Disease Weaponization – Strengthening Law Enforcement and National Legislation* held in Geneva, in 2003, and the workshop: *Bioterrorism Prevention*, held in Bucharest, Romania, in October 2004. Professor Kellman is also organizing extensive networks to help nations comply with recently adopted U.N. Security Council Resolution 1540, including a workshop in Geneva held in December, 2004, and a follow-on workshop soon to be held in New York City.
